



Risk Factors vs Protective Factors

Risk Factors

Individual

low self esteem, depression, unemployment, gender roles, prior history, low academic achievement, desire for power and control, etc.

Relationship

marital instability, male dominance, economic stress, unhealthy family relationships, etc.

Community

poverty, low social capital, peer behaviors and attitudes, weak community IPV sanctions, etc.

Societal

gender norms, societal norms that maintain women's inferiority, high violence tolerance levels.


Workshop Ideology







Interesting ...

- Men with children were least likely to change their belief in the right direction concerning the idea "men should make the decisions in the relationship" than men without children.
- Unpartnered men were more likely to change their KABB when asked "Do women have the right to say no" in the right direction that partnered men.
- Men ages 25-54 were more likely to change their KABB in the right direction when asked "are most women who report rape telling the truth" than men under 25 or men over 55. Men over 55, however, were more likely to change their KABB in the wrong direction than the other two age groups.
- Men under 25 were more likely to change their KABB in the wrong direction when asked "when a man hits his partner, can it be her fault for provoking it" than their 25-42 and over 55 peers.

#2: Focus Groups used to select most compelling messages and the most effective media in Quincy, WA; Reading, PA; and Homestead, FL




Outcomes

- 3 messages were selected
- Men selected the messages felt the best way to communicate these messages to their peers is through video WITH the opportunity to discuss these messages.
- MCN created three videos with accompanying print pieces and discussion guides.


