What is Rape Culture?

Rape Culture is a widely used term describing a culture in which rape and sexual violence are common. Prevalent attitudes, norms, practices, and media condone, normalize, excuse and encourage sexualized violence.

In a Rape Culture, both men and women assume that sexual violence is a fact of life. However, much of what we accept as inevitable is in fact the expression of values and attitudes that <u>can</u> change.

Supporting the Youth in Your Life

Help dismantle gender roles:

- » "Boys will be boys" is not a thing in this house. Behavior will not be attributed to gender's perceived stereotypical faults.
- » You are beautiful, yes, but you are also clever and smart. Reinforce that all children are more than appearances.
- » Encourage boys to express emotion.

Reinforce body boundaries:

- » No means no.
- » Tickles are great, but only when you want them.
- » Don't make children give hugs to relatives or others when they don't want to.
- » Teach children that if a sibling, cousin, or friend is crying because of their rough housing, to stop that what they are doing immediately and check in.
- » Learn and use real names for body parts.

Encourage empathy:

- » If you see someone being bullied, stand up for them.
- » Explain why you are sorry. Make sure children are clear about why certain behavior is unacceptable. As a parent, model by explaining why you are sorry when you apologize.
- » Model kindness in interactions with others.
